# A Note from the Director

Canterbury ElderCollege has in some often very subtle ways proven to be of immense value and importance to many of us. Many of our ElderCollege participants enjoy the casual 'lite' learning. Many others, myself included, enjoy the challenge of taking an idea and developing a course—sometimes in an entirely new area of interest! And, of course, almost all of us enjoy that warmth of social contact and conversation over tea or coffee and cookies or other goodies. Indeed, it is the social side of ElderCollege which offers so much of that which is positive in our collective ElderCollege courses. We enjoy learning and we enjoy socialising and so far, Covid-19 has stolen that latter enjoyment from us. Yet sometimes one must make sacrifices and undertake things that really you would prefer not to do. I am still not a fan of online learning whether it is for our schools, universities or ElderCollege. Fortunately, in respect to ElderCollege, our efforts to offer a bit of online learning comes in non-threatening packages. We don't have tests and we don't have assignments and we probably take courses simply for the sheer pleasure of learning in a casual environment. After all, what could be more casual than some of you relaxing at home while taking online courses? On an experimental basis with support from the Government of Canada's Emergency Support Fund (ESCF) through the WindsorEssex Community Foundation (WECF) we undertook just over a dozen online courses in Autumn 2020. We did it in order, first, to ensure that the concept of ElderCollege did not vanish as we certainly would much prefer the Covid-19 virus to vanish— permanently! Second, we felt an immense sense of obligation to all those wonderful people who have supported Canterbury ElderCollege in our first ten years of providing opportunities to people aged 55 and better. We owe all of you a debt and we thought that in order to bridge the gap perhaps some of the courses might work in this pandemic emergency as an opportunity for all of us to escape, however briefly, from lock-down and concern about our aging health. Third, having seen these online courses as an experiment we offered more courses in our Winter 2021 semester. They were well received and, thus we are again offering a limited range of courses as a late Spring 2021 semester.

Well we think that for many people the experiment worked. And we had course participants from across Canada, the USA and northern Ontario. This is exciting for ElderCollege and it is keeping the ElderCollege concept thriving.

So, and until we are able to resume some semblance of safe and healthy normalcy, we are offering another set of online courses. We still plan and hope to retrieve our central ElderCollege purposes—interactive and social education but until some serious normalcy returns here is our third online set of course offerings for late Spring 2021.

We are now moving forward with several new and innovative courses for this short late Spring 2021 Semester. Marilyn and I will take some of you along on a sea voyage with archeological stops as we travel the Frankincense and Myrrh trail through the Suez Canal and on to the Land of Cyprus. We will see how the future unfolds as we probably may need to continue online for awhile and that may include our Autumn 2021 Semester.

And please extend your gratitude for all her hard and valuable work ElderCollege's Programme Manager Catherine Fettes and please, don't forget Laura Macmillan (who has added a new little team member while on leave) but who also did some hard work putting the first experimental courses together. Both colleagues took on the challenge of preserving ElderCollege through online course offerings. They worked the technology and brainstormed the means whereby courses can be offered. Me, I just sat at home writing nasty Opinion columns for The Windsor Star and struggling to learn all about ancient Canadian political mythology.

Welcome to Canterbury ElderCollege Online & may the full Vaccination be with you as we all really want to get back together for cookies and tea...Eh!

### **Session #1: Thurs. May 20th**

“Portrait of Alice and Louise Cummings”: Learn about Scottish-Canadian artist *James Kerr-Lawson*, and create your own yarn art!

Materials Needed: yarn (3-4 colours), glue stick, construction paper

Alternative Materials: string, liquid glue, paper

### **Session #2: Tues. May 25th**

“White Pine”: Learn about Ontarian sculptor *Tom Benner* and create your own clay and make your own clay impressions!

Materials Needed: flour (4 cups), salt (1.5 cups), water (1.5 cups), large bowl for mixing, small bowl or cookie cutter (for cutting clay), natural found materials (sticks, leaves, flowers, etc.), paper, food colouring (optional), carving tools e.g.: butter knife, cookie cutter, toothpick, scissors (optional)

### **Session #3: Thurs. June 3rd**

“Chickens”: Learn about British-Canadian drawer, printmaker, and painter *Mary Wrinch*, and create your own floral arrangement with clay!

“Belle Isle Bridge and Riverboat”: Learn about Windsor’s own landscape artist *Thomas Roach*, and learn how to create your own waterscape using oil pastels!

Materials Needed: oil pastels, paint brushes, paper

Alternative Materials: crayons (you can do similar oil pastel techniques with crayons, though they tend not to blend or layer as well as oil pastels), sponge and/or toothbrush

BIO NOTE: **Alice** has been working with clay since 1966 and creates wheel thrown stoneware pottery. She teaches pottery classes in the area and has been an exhibitor at Art in the Park since 1970. A long-time AGW volunteer, her skills in pottery, her optimistic teaching style, and the presence of her furry co-stars Wee Angus, Pirate Teddy, Bob the Cat, and Miss Penny never fail to bring a smile to our faces. Alice has led many virtual programs in 2020 including Sundays in the Studio, Virtual Pottery Workshops, and guided virtual Gallery Tours. **Suela** joined the Art Gallery of Windsor at the beginning of 2020. Her first project with the AGW was in March where she taught art classes within the AGW’s Sundays in the Studio program. She participated in the Downtown Art Fair that was organized in late September (when businesses started to open up a bit). In November, Suela led 1,2,3 Create, an online workshop via Zoom.

## Accessible Diversity: Culture and International Perspectives on Disability

This presentation will focus on different international attitudes on disability including the United Nations protection granted to such people. Join us to hear about, Operation Smile in Panama, disability policies in Egypt, the Wheelchair dance in Australia, Native disabilities in Canada, and an accessible theatre in China. There will be an overview of how international perspectives vary and stories of the disability population around the world including a 40-year retrospective on the disability movement in Sweden from the man who gave them their first braille newspapers. We will learn about the educational journey of a disability advocate from Serbia and take an indigenous cultural look at disability in New Zealand. We'll also explore customs such as the Ethiopian coffee ceremony which is designed to bridge the gulf between the disabled and able-bodied populations by working toward a common goal. This course is based on international interviews ranging from a summit on disabilities from years ago to an interview with a deaf UN representative who helped to write global legal law on disabilities. Culled from the collections of local brewerianist Bill Marentette, Walkerville Brewery owner Mike Brkovich and others, this is an opportunity to explore fascinating stories coupled with rare, unpublished photos and artifacts from Windsor's Original Six Breweries: British-American, Walkerville, Riverside, Hofer, Tecumseh and Old Comrades. We will also highlight some of Detroit's most popular beers, the impact of Prohibition on local breweries, and take a stroll down memory lane in Lost Bars of Windsor, featuring Roadhouses, Saloons, Taverns and Hotels. ## Early Days of Canadian Military and Infantry Training Challenges: Wolseley Barracks London, ON (1883 – 1919)

Whether you are a resident of London, Ontario, or live in another province, you may have heard about the military base in our city. But did you know that the building identified as “A” Block was designated a national historic site in 1963 and its west wing is home to The RCR Museum? Initially known as the Infantry School building, it was erected between 1886 and 1888 to host D Company of the Infantry School Corps (ISC). The building and its grounds have seen some of the most important events in Canadian military history between 1883 and 1920, such as the participation in the South African War or the First World War. The course will review the architecture of the building, its uses and roles; in doing so, the course will unveil some little-known aspects of military recruiting and training in southwestern Ontario. As well, this session will include a lecture, with an online live tour of the grounds and the museum at Wolseley Barracks. Class Size: Max. 95

## From the Land Of Frankincense And Myrrh To The Land Of Cyprus – With Some Stops Along the Way

This course is a pleasant Travel-Adventure. We shall begin in a couple of places in the United Arab Emirates then drop into another couple of places in Muscat and Oman—the home of Frankincense and Myrrh. We'll also visit an important World Heritage archeological site in Oman where trade in both exotic substances originated. Then we will pass through some dangerous waters and enter the Red Sea. Therein we will briefly visit Aqaba (Jordan) and a small coastal village (Safaga) in Egypt.

Thereafter we will transit the Suez Canal and navigate to the Land of Cyprus where we shall visit another World Heritage archeological site. We shall end our journey with a brief stop in Catania (Sicily) just for lunch.

It all began with a series of nation states, which issued their own stamps; and then, through various, almost catastrophic, upheavals, the country developed into the nation that we know today. ## **In Harm's Way: Experiences of a Canadian Military Medic**

William Wilson served as a Canadian Forces medic and physician's assistant, post Cold War, in a variety of locations, including Afghanistan, Bosnia and Rawanda. He has documented his experiences in a slide show presentation that depicts daily life and conditions in these and other unfamiliar lands. He also served on a Canadian Navy Frigate during a circumnavigation of Africa. Bill's pictures tell a remarkable story of life under very difficult conditions, in places distant from Canada. This presentation will help you understand what has occurred in places most of us have only read about in newspapers or seen on television. It is an experience that will help you understand the work that our Canadian Forces undertake around the world. Class Size: Max. 40

## **Uniquely Canadian: Ecanada Art Pottery**

In May 1912, George Emery arrived in Hamilton, Ontario. At age 31, George Emery had spent almost 20 years apprenticing, working and designing at Josiah Wedgwood and Sons workshops and factories at Etruria, a suburb of Stoke-on-Trent, Staffordshire, England. Wedgwood is especially associated with the "dry-bodied" (unglazed) stoneware or "Jasperware" a type of pottery first developed by Josiah Wedgwood in the 1770s. Initially employed by the Canadian Porcelain Company in Hamilton, George Emery listed himself as a ceramist in 1926, eventually establishing his own company, Ecanada in 1944 in Hamilton ON.

Thereafter until 1952 his company produced a unique Canadian style of Jasperware which is usually marked in several distinct ways. Ecanada pottery reflects the Wedgwood decorative style. Ecanada comes in a multitude of colours and a wide assortment of decorative and useful shapes and decorations. In this course we shall introduce you to this unique type of Canadian pottery sometimes referred to as Canadian Wedgwood and we shall offer views of many diverse Ecanada pottery pieces and how to identify this unique ware.
